



President's Message

Spring is an exciting time of the year. I hear fishing has been pretty good, just not for me, birds are singing and building nests, green has returned to the prairies and a new field season is upon us. Many of you are enjoying working in the outdoors and are looking forward to a productive 2014. Early this year a piece of legislation we have all been watching and trying to influence for four years now finally passed. The Farm Bill was signed by the President on February 7. With the passage of this bill came many exciting new policies and programs SD TWS has supported that will benefit wildlife in South Dakota.

One policy was the re-linking of conservation compliance to eligibility for federal crop insurance premiums. This requires farmers to refrain from farming highly erodible land without a conservation plan or draining wetlands if they want to have part of the crop insurance premium (Usually over 65%) paid for by Uncle Sam. A couple of years ago this re-linkage was thought to be an impossible task. This was critical for the future of South Dakota's wetland dependent wildlife.

Another victory for wildlife conservation in South Dakota was the enactment of the Sod-saver provision. Sod-saver reduces the federal premium subsidy by 50 percentage points on any ground that is converted from grassland with no cropping history (native sod) to a tillable crop for the first four years. It also ends that ability of farmers to transfer yields from other more highly productive farmland to the newly broken ground. Native grassland conversion to cropland has been occurring at record pace over the past five years and this new disincentive couldn't happen soon enough for South Dakota's grassland dependent wildlife.

Congress also did a little bit of consolidation and shrinking of some of the Farm Bill conservation programs, but the positive side is that we still have all the conservation programs. USDA has already held signups for some exciting new initiatives as well as the newly named Ag Conservation Easement Program (WRP/GRP of the past). By the time this newsletter reaches you it is hoped that continuous CRP sign-up will have started as well.



A new program called the Regional Conservation Partnership Program will present new opportunities for creative minds to partner with USDA using their existing programs and some partner match to make the funding from the federal Farm Bill go further. This program may have huge potential to benefit wildlife in South Dakota.

Great work to all of you who helped support the passage of these historical federal policies and programs in the 2014 Farm Bill!

Comment Paper to US Forest Service regarding Elk Mountain Reforestation

We have had great support from other conservation organizations such as SCI-GDC, BH Sportsman's Club, Custer County Commission, and the SD Bighorn Sheep Working Group, all in opposition to this proposal.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

USDA Forest Service

Purpose Of and Need for the Project USFS Proposal

The purpose of this project is to provide ponderosa pine regeneration on the portion of Elk Mountain that burned in 2001. This action is needed because high fire intensities left vast areas deforested, with no available natural seed source for regeneration. Forest Service Manual (FSM 2472.02) direction states that there is an objective to "maintain all forest lands within the National Forest System in appropriate forest cover" and to "achieve desired time and stocking level goals in a cost-effective manner." Each Regional Forester has the responsibility under FSM 2472.04a (4) to "ensure each area deforested by natural causes; fire, or harvest can be accounted (tracked as "not stocked") for until it is certified" as stocked with enough regeneration to provide a future forested stand of trees. The Black Hills National Forest Land and Resource Management Plan, as amended (Forest Plan), Standard 2416, Phase II Amendment, Chapter II-27, states that "the minimum (stocking) level considered adequate for restocking is 150 seedlings per acre for conifers (ponderosa pine). This represents what is required, considering natural mortality, to produce a merchantable timber stand at rotation age without intermediate treatments."

The area proposed for reforestation is approximately 2,056 acres and is within Management Area (MA) 5.1. The Forest Plan has designated MA 5.1 as Resource Production Emphasis. This area is to be managed as forested ecosystems through a full range of management options to meet a variety of ecological and human needs. Areas in MA 5.1 are to be managed for wood products, water yield, and forage production, while providing a diversity of wildlife and visual quality.

TWS comments describing our objections to this action are available on the SDTWS website and are not supporting this action because of bighorn sheep utilizing this area as annual range both in SD and Wyoming.
