President's Message

Greetings PA Wildlifers!

It is an honor and privilege to be writing to you as your new President of the PA Chapter of the Wildlife Society. I have spent the last few years serving on the Board and look forward to my new role in the organization. It has been a wonderful experience thus far and I would encourage all of you to consider running for Board positions in future elections. Our chapter is comprised of some of the best wildlife professionals in the state and we need your continued involvement and support to effectively advocate for the natural resources of Pennsylvania.

After a seemingly unending winter, spring has finally arrived! Many of us are grateful to see signs of new life and are looking forward to the summer field season. Although this time of year often brings a renewed passion for the outdoors, this past winter was certainly not lacking in wildlife "excitement" around the state. Pennsylvania House Bill 1576 was the focus of many discussions as it sat poised to fundamentally change the current process for listing endangered and threatened species in PA. Through effective lobbying efforts, countless letters to legislators, and a united campaign among wildlife professionals, the bill was removed from the table in the Pennsylvania State House on Feb 10, 2014. As we celebrate this success, we must recognize that it is only temporary. Supporters of the bill have promised that a new "revised" version will be proposed in the future. No one knows what the

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new version will look like or how much of our input will be considered. So for now, we simply wait.

This past winter also brought with it one of the largest irruptions of Snowy owls observed in the Northeast and Great Lakes regions in the last four decades. Social media, newspapers,

and television stations were quick to jump at the chance to broadcast information and create an avenue for reporting Snowy owl observations. The irruption also served as a unique opportunity for numerous agencies and organizations to coordinate and launch Project SNOWstorm as a tool for gathering data and mapping Snowy owls during the event. The conference requires a small army of volunteers to make it happen. And like the army, volunteering requires commitment. Join our volunteer ranks and help make a difference!

What you're signing up for

If you join this dedicated and enthusiastic army, your assignments must take priority over any and all other commitments at the time of the Conference. Other stipulations include:

Volunteers must register to attend the conference.

Assignments are in 4-hour blocks (some exceptions may apply).

In return, you'll get a heartfelt thank you, the undying admiration of the Volunteer Coordinator, and a FREE conference volunteer t-shirt.

Are you a student?

While most volunteers will have to be satisfied knowing they are the backbone of the conference, student volunteers are eligible to receive reimbursement. The reimbursement rate is \$7 per hour. Payment is intended to offset expenses (i.e. registration, lodging, meals, parking) for volunteers not receiving

full support from their educational institution for attending the conference.

As a volunteer, you may decline payment. Volunteers with the means to pay for their own expenses are encouraged to decline payment. Checks for payment will be distributed during the conference or shortly thereafter. Payments to volunteers will be limited to a first come, first served basis until all required volunteer time slots are filled and/or the available budget is exhausted.

On Sunday, students had the opportunity to participate in competitions such as archery, mammal identification, bird identification, and tree identification before heading home. 
ology Department. Avery has participated in dolphin research in the Bahamas and has been accepted into a short-term study abroad to continue working with dolphins in Bimini.

An Online Manual and 2-day Workshop at Pennsylvania State University

Workshop Objectives: Advances in technology have resulted in large spatial datasets for aquatic and terrestrial populations that require data compilation and analysis for making sound resource management and conservation decisions. From GIS and GPS dataset manipulation to traditional estimators of home range, this course will provide hands-on learning to handle a variety of datasets all within the free software R (R Foundation for Statistical Computing, Vienna, Austria). You will develop skills in understanding and processing complex datasets without ever needing ArcMap or related costly programs.

Fee: Professionals \$249, students \$100. Will include: manual, refreshments, lunch for both days


