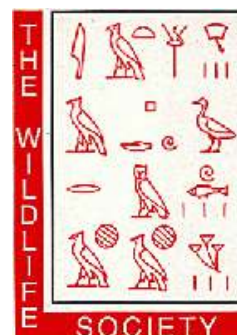

Treasurer's Report 2013/2014

Our beginning balance was \$9,998.79; income was \$6823.41 and total expenditures were \$6,725.12. Our ending balance in 2013 was \$10,097.08.

Approved by Exec Board. An audit committee will be chosen to review financial records.

Election Results

Councilperson-at-large: Scott Beckerman

President Elect: Scott Meister

Eric mentioned making bylaw changes made to accommodate online voting rather than restricted to paper ballots.

Student Chapter

Eric will be covering Past President duties as facilitator between student and state chapters. He will also be serving as Student Chapter Advisor for SIU and will try to increase communication between other student chapters in the state.

2015 Meeting

Exec Board discussed the site of next meeting. If we stick with traditional rotation, it will be in northern Illinois. Sites including Rockford, Moline, Chicago, and sites with college chapters were proposed.

Voting Bylaws

For the previous election we couldn't get more than 1 candidate for some positions. Current bylaws say we must have a slate consisting of "2 candidates". It was suggested to change wording to "at least 2" to allow for more. Bylaws also mention "written ballots". We should change wording to allow for "online voting". Will consult national chapter examples on the subject for reference on how to word the proposed changes.

Conservation Affairs Committee

Eric explained it was an Initiative by Parent Chapter to coordinate with State Chapters and create a human resources database of go-to people on various issues related to policy. Gary Potts further explained one goal is to develop local position statements modeled after the national position statements. Another goal is really to get more people involved in policy. All agreed it is a great avenue and something we should promote within our chapter.

Eric brought up that we need to generate interest for Exec Board positions. It is current exec board's job to make an effort to search for potential candidates. It could help to start the search even earlier. Bob inquired about nominating committee that has traditionally had alternating terms for continuity. We will discuss nominating committee at Chapter Board Meeting.

Parent Chapter Report, Parent Chapter VP, Gary Potts

- Gary spoke on his efforts to switch the Midwest Section meeting to January and February to improve student attendance. Gary served on the hiring committee that hired Ken Williams. Williams strives to improve budget situation and has already seen improvement. Gary served on committees involving bylaws changes and strategic planning.
- Currently there are low numbers subscribing to TWS publications, particularly The Wildlife Society Bulletin. Gary encouraged more people to subscribe. Membership numbers are currently stable but we will soon see numbers dip due to retirements.
- Ken Williams has hired great new staff who are skilled marketers. Gov't Affairs reps, Laura Bies and Keith Norris do a great job dealing with congress and agency budgets. They are great at collaborating with other agencies on various topics.

- At the Midwest Annual Meeting Gary met with fisheries representatives several times. It has been proposed that TWS have joint meeting in 2017 with American Fisheries Society in Tampa, FL.
- Gary encouraged IL membership to reference National position statements when developing statements on local issues.

Old Business, Eric Schauber

- We have been in violation of our by-laws the last 2 years for Exec Board voting. Last year we had 1 candidate for a position and this year 3. A by-laws change was proposed to change by-law wording to allow for “at least” 2 candidates.
- Randy Smith motioned to accept the changes. Tom Micetich second. Chapter approved motion. Proposal will be passed on to Parent Chapter to be approved.

Position Statement on Feral Swine, Gary Potts and Scott Beckerman

The Parent Society position statement was completed as a national viewpoint. Gary and Scott are using the national statement as a model to tailor one to fit specifically to the issue in Illinois and will submit it to the Chapter for approval when completed.

Emiquon/Illinois River Connectivity Project, Steve Havera

TNC owns the wetland areas of Emiquon known as Thompson and Flag lakes that currently function independently of the Illinois River. Native flora and waterbird communities are very diverse in the area. There are very few issues with sedimentation and contaminants that are typically associated with the Illinois River and its floodplain wetlands. TNC is interested in experimenting with connectivity of Emiquon to the Illinois River to mimic natural and historic wetland hydrology and to assist with river function downstream. They would do this by installing a structure that would be managed to control water levels. Steve and many others believe this structure will do little to benefit the river and that it will severely degrade the habitat quality of Emiquon. In 2006 ICTWS drafted a position statement on floodplain connectivity which has been passed by the Parent Chapter. He would like to pass this statement, along with 5 other National Chapter position statements, to the TNC and Army Corps of Engineers who are currently accepting open comment on the issue.

Professional Award of Merit, Gary Potts

Stan Etter, Steve Havera, and Gary served on PAM committee. Gary reviewed the current wording for requirements of the Award. Stan put together a list of amendments to the requirements:

- voting members in good standing (TWS members with current dues paid for 5 years and attendees of 2 annual meetings)
- letters of nomination coming from voting members in good standing for 3 years
- restricted to living conservationists who are active in Illinois
- award given only in years when there is a truly deserving candidate
- award members should be implemented on rotating 3 year terms, rotated to provide continuity
- There was discussion on our ability to verify the 5 year requirement, and that it would be difficult particularly with the electronic record-keeping system. It was agreed that with a combination of good record keeping and the sharp memories of nominating committee, the Chapter will be able to verify the requirement.
- The amendments were accepted as presented by the committee.

New Business

- 2015 Meeting, Eric Schauber
Traditionally we have rotated locations of meetings, but have mostly stayed in Central IL over the past few years. The Exec Board briefly discussed moving it to Northern IL, but came to no firm decisions. It was discussed that we should try to stay close to our Student Affiliates and that Northern IL/Chicago is expensive. Several members expressed support for Champaign and it was decided that we will look further into having it there.
 - Credit Card
 - Randy Smith brought up that with more members being interested in paying dues or meeting fees online, it might be in the Chapter's best interest to look into getting a credit card account.
 - Luke Garver mentioned that PayPal could be another avenue to allow for electronic transfer of funds and can be set up with an email and bank account.
 - Ed Zwicker cautioned the Chapter to be aware of any fees associated with credit cards and electronic payments.
 - Pass the Gavel
Eric Schauber passed the honor and responsibility of President to Bob Clevestine. Bob mentioned that it was a tremendous honor to be named President (despite the dubious circumstances to which he arrived at the position). He honored the members of the "Old Timer's Panel" and will carry out his duties "standing on the shoulders of giants."
