The conference provided an opportunity for undergraduate students, graduate students, postdoctoral researchers, and other wildlife professionals to share ongoing and completed research efforts in the wildlife field. Institutions and agencies represented at the conference were West Virginia University, Marshall University, University of Delaware, and the West Virginia Division of Natural Resources, and a variety of research topics included amphibians, reptiles, songbirds, waterfowl, and macroinvertebrates. The award for best student oral presentation was presented to Gordon Dimmig (West Virginia University), and the award for best student poster presentation was presented to Emily Mausteller (Marshall University). 



Marshes"



SUNY Cobleskill Student Chapter Earns Accolades at NE Student Conclave, NE Fish and Wildlife Conference

The SUNY Cobleskill Student Chapter of The Wildlife Society brought 15 student members to the Northeast Student Conclave in Old Orchard Beach, ME from 12-14 April 2019. While diverse workshops are a major draw for students looking to learn new skills or sharpen previously learned skills, the competitions that Conclave features are equally important to some. This year, SUNY Cobleskill earned a 3rd place finish (out of 12 teams) in the highly competitive Quiz Bowl. This year's Conclave Quiz Bowl team consisted of Aaron France, Alyssa Holliday, Haley Keff, Brandon Metzinger, and Colby Slezak (captain). In addition, MaKenna Martin, Tyler Gottstein, and Quill Silverman made up the SUNY Cobleskill BioBlitz team which earned a 2nd place finish overall. There were also two individual competitions consisting of wildlife and plant identification and fire-making. Our own Colby Slezak earned a 1st place finish in the wildlife and plant identification challenge, while Bailey Mitchell earned a 1st place finish for SUNY Cobleskill in the fire-making challenge.

Immediately after attending the Northeast Student Conclave, Colby Slezak and Dr. Roger J. Masse (student chapter advisor) attended the award ceremony of the 75th annual Northeast Fish and Wildlife Conference in Groton, CT. At the ceremony, Colby accepted the P. F. English Memorial Award given by the Northeast Section of TWS to the outstanding graduating senior in a wildlife management program. Colby's academic excellence, dedication to the wildlife profession, and consistent involvement in TWS at local, state, regional, and national levels set him apart from his peers.



Following graduation, Colby will be moving to Rhode Island where he will begin his MSc program at University of Rhode Island during Fall 2019. Dr. Masse was also acknowledged at the award ceremony by being selected for the John Pearce Memorial Award. The Northeast Section of TWS gives this award to acknowledge outstanding professional accomplishment in any aspect of wildlife conservation. TWS Organization Units Gather Senate Support for State and Tribal Wildlife Grants Program

Several organization units worked in concert with TWS headquarters staff to request Senators sign a Dear Colleague Letter in support of adequate funding for the State and Tribal Wildlife Grants program. This effort and the engagement of partner organizations such as the Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies and the National Wildlife Federation resulted in 46 Senators encouraging robust funding for the program. Some organization



units including the South Dakota Chapter also followed up with House offices thanking them for their support of the program on the previously circulated House Dear Colleague Letter.



TWS Responds to USGS Travel Policy

The Wildlife Society, with 10 other member organizations of the USGS Coalition, commented on a new internal memo circulated by USGS Director James Reilly that would restrict the ability of USGS employees to attend and engage in professional conferences. The new policy is reportedly on hold pending further review by the Survey.


