# AMERICAN FISHERIES SOCIETY & THE WILDLIFE SOCIETY 2019 JOINT ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Notes from Casey Heimerl...

I was fortunate enough to represent SDTWS at the 2019 American Fisheries Society & The Wildlife Society annual joint conference in Reno, Nevada from September 29th -October 3rd. This was the first time these two organizations held a joint conference and with approximately 4,500 people in attendance, it was estimated to be the largest gathering of fish and wildlife professionals.



The conference offered an excellent opportunity to collaborate and network with wildlife professionals throughout the United States and other countries and provided learning opportunities through a multitude of symposia, presentations and workshops.

While at the conference, I attended the annual Conservation Affairs Network Meeting where updates were provided and discussed

regarding CANS involvement in several TWS Policy priorities including Recovering Americas Wildlife Act, Invasive Species, Cooperative Research Unit funding, and changes to the Endangered Species Act. You can view a copy of the meeting

I also attended the annual TWS Sections and Chapter Collaboration Meeting where attendees from approximately 20 other states exchanged a variety of information and ideas regarding membership, annual meetings, fund raising, committee chairs and educational opportunities.

#### **Wildlife Diversity Committee Report**

Recovering America's Wildlife Act: Our Chapter sent a letter to Representative Dusty Johnson on July 29 describing the need for passage of this bill to provide stable, long-term funding to state and tribal wildlife agencies and asking that he cospon-

sor and support passage of House of Representatives (HR) 3742. As of today, we have received no response from him.



The bill has not yet been introduced in the U.S. Senate. When that happens, we will ask for your help in reaching out to Senators Rounds and Thune, although contacts at any time are important to raise their awareness about this effort. As of today, HR 3742 has 123 cosponsors. South Dakota's natural resources have tremendous potential to gain from this effort, and it's important that we show broad support for it. Here is how you can help:

Contact Rep. Johnson asking that he cosponsor HR 3742 and facilitate passage of the bill in the U.S. House. 
