

## MNTWS Forest Committee Report

### 1. MNTWS Fly in Letter

Several of us developed a “Fly In” letter to be personally delivered to Congressional Staff this week by three MNTWS members. The current virus outbreak prevented the “Fly In” which prompted a “Call In” alternative. As of now, we do not know when this “Call In” will occur.

Our letter consisted of four sections and they included;

**I. Placing Wildlife Population and Habitat Loss in Context.** We identified the (a) alarming increase in the number of rare species listings the past 17 years at the state and national scales, (b) Past and Present Disturbances to Wildlife Habitat including urban sprawl, mining, energy development, invasive species, forest insects & Disease and climate change. (c) We also discussed the unprecedented number of environmental rollbacks initiated by the Trump Administration including impacts to wildlife (weakening of ESA, Migratory Bird Treaty Act, and NEPA etc.).

**II. Benefits/Services Provided by Healthy Wildlife Habitat.** We discussed how expanding, protecting and/or restoring wildlife habitat contributes to healthy economies, cleaner and safer water supplies, flood and erosion control, cleaner air and combating climate change at the state and national scales. We highlighted a US Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) study that concluded that outdoor wildlife watching activities like bird watching generate more than \$600 million in economic benefit in Minnesota per year.

**III. Recommended Legislative Actions.** We identified and suggested congressional staff endorse or promote nine proposed pieces of legislation most notably the “Recovering America’s Wildlife Act (H.R. 3742)” and “Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2020 (Public Law No. 116-94) State and Tribal Wildlife Grants (SWG) program in Fiscal Year 2020.”

**IV. Other Recommended Considerations.** Although not currently addressed in specific legislation, we requested that the Congressional Delegation give thoughtful consideration to: (1) Preservation of, access to, and sustainable management of our public lands, (2) Reversal of the continued loss and degradation of grassland and wetland habitats in Minnesota’s prairie/farmland region and (3) Support for non-toxic alternatives to lead ammunition and fishing tackle

### 2. Ongoing Engagement with Timber Harvest on Wildlife Mgt. Areas

MNTWS continues to be involved with implementation of the DNR’s Sustainable Timber Harvest. As mentioned in previous Newsletter, last October we submitted a letter to the Commissioner, Governor and others pertaining to proposed excessive timber harvest on WMAs resulting from the DNR’s Sustainable Timber Harvest Analysis (STHA) and subsequent Determination (STHD).

Our primary concerns outlined in the letter included:

1. Potential noncompliance with laws and policies regarding WMAs.
2. Negative impacts on wildlife habitats and populations, especially rare and federally listed species.
3. Inadequate respect for Wildlife Managers’ expertise in DNR processes and with the public

Then in Mid-November 2019 MNTWS was one of 14 organizations that signed on to a letter sent to the Governor and Commissioner by the Isaak Walton League (IKES). This letter in part stated:

*“We recommend a halt to implementation of DNR’s STHI until the concerns of sportsmen and women are addressed, and WMAs and AMAs are managed for their intended purpose of habitat first and foremost. This purpose is clearly stated in the enabling language for creation of our WMA, found in Minnesota law (Minn.Stat. §86.A05 Subd. 8, “...for the production of wildlife, for public hunting, fishing,*

*and trapping, and for other compatible outdoor recreational uses.”), and their management plans (Minn.Stat.§84.941-84.942). Short-sighted pressure to increase timber harvest under the plan may place Federal Aid (Pittman-Robertson Act funds), forest certification, critical habitats, and fish and wildlife diversity at risk. It ignores the investment citizens have made, and continue to make, in protecting and stewarding many of these public lands through Legacy Amendment expenditures for habitat protections and improvements.”*

In Mid-January we along with the IKES, Trout Unlimited and other conservation groups and individuals met with the DNR Commissioner and her staff in person to discuss our concerns. They listened to what we had to say but as of yet, we have not heard any definitive, targeted responses to our questions or requests.

Our strategy now is to wait for the results of ongoing internal audits regarding PR and federal aide as it relates to proposed or current management of WMAs. Once audit findings are released, we along with our other partners will determine the next steps.

### **3. Lakes States Forest Management Bat Habitat Conservation Plan (BHCP)**

In July 2018 MNTWS provided comments to the DNR regarding the Bat Habitat Conservation Plan. We provided comments on three draft BHCP chapters (I-Introduction, II-Covered Lands and III-Activities and Environmental Setting). We did hear a reply that our comments were considered, and in some cases incorporated.

Recently the BHCP planning team requested public comments on chapters 4 (“Take Assessment”) and 5 (“Conservation Strategy”) of the BHCP. Comments are due April 30<sup>th</sup> of this year. Forest Committee member Chris Smith has offered to take the lead in providing comments on behalf of MNTWS. We will keep MNTWS members updated on the status of the BHCP. 


