Recovering America's Wildlife Act continues towards passage – but we need your help! –

Thanks to the continuous work of TWS members and partners, the [Recovering America's Wildlife Act](#) continues on a positive trajectory on Capitol Hill. With conversations moving forward on a potential funding mechanism for the legislation being tied to cryptocurrency assets, bipartisan agreement is within reach.

The bill is now being considered for inclusion in the end-of-year funding package, but additional support is still needed to secure its adoption. Now is the final opportunity to make your voice heard this Congress. Please let TWS staff know if you are interested in participating in virtual meetings on behalf of your unit with members of Congress to build support for the bill. TWS units support the Recovering America's Wildlife Act in an Alliance for America's Fish and Wildlife sign-on letter – A total of 9 TWS organization units, including the [Arizona](#), [Arkansas](#), [Illinois](#), [Maine](#), [Maryland-Delaware](#), [Nebraska](#), [New Mexico](#), [Pennsylvania](#), and [Texas](#) Chapters of The Wildlife Society, joined The Wildlife Society in asking Congress to pass the Recovering America's Wildlife Act by the end of 2022. The [sign-on letter](#) was led by the [Alliance for America's Fish and Wildlife](#), and was sent to majority and minority leaders in the U.S. House and Senate.

Virginia chapter members join TWS staff to advocate for the Recovering America's Wildlife Act – Members of the [Virginia Chapter of The Wildlife Society](#) and TWS staff participated in a meeting with Representative Jennifer Wexton's office to provide updates on, and request support for, the Recovering America's Wildlife Act. CAN leadership opportunity in TWS Northeast Section – The [Northeast Section of The Wildlife Society](#) is seeking a member interested in serving as the Section's CAC Chair. Federal Updates

Lesser prairie chicken listed under ESA – The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service recently [announced Endangered Species Act](#) protections for two distinct population segments (DPS) of the lesser prairie chicken (*Tympanuchus pallidicinctus*), a grassland bird that has been the focus of conservation efforts for decades. The Northern DPS can be found in certain regions Texas, Oklahoma, Colorado, and Kansas, and was designated as threatened, while the Southern DPS, ranging from the Texas panhandle to New Mexico, received an endangered designation. Northern long-eared bat uplisted to endangered – The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service published a [final rule](#) reclassifying the Northern long-eared bat to endangered under the

Endangered Species Act (ESA). The species was originally listed as threatened back in 2015, but now faces an increased risk of extinction due to the rapid expansion of white-nose syndrome. This [upgraded listing](#) to endangered will nullify the regulations around take in the 4(d) rule of the ESA previously applied to the species, removing federal flexibility in managing human activities that result in harming or killing of northern long-eared bats. The final rule will go into effect on Jan. 30, 2023. *Staff contact:* [Caroline Murphy](#)

Bald & Golden Eagle Protection Act Comment deadline extended – The US Fish and Wildlife Service is [extending](#) the comment period on proposed [rule changes](#) to the implementation of permitting under the [Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act](#). The proposal aims to increase participation in the permitting process to improve compliance and bald and golden eagle conservation. The proposal includes the creation of general permitting programs for four activities: wind energy projects, power line infrastructure, disturbance of breeding bald eagles, and bald eagle nest take. TWS is currently reviewing the proposed rule, and welcomes input from TWS membership on its potential impacts to wildlifers and bald and golden eagle populations. Congress once again approaches funding deadline – Congress has a self-imposed deadline of December 16 to finalize a government [funding package](#) for the remainder of [fiscal year 2023](#), which began in October. In what is now an all too familiar tale, no bipartisan congressional negotiations are occurring at present, meaning Congress will likely have to continue funding the federal government under current funding levels until at least December 23. All parties do not want consideration of a full-year package to be extended into the New Year, but agreement on top-line numbers that would allow for negotiations to begin has remained elusive. *Staff contact:* [Caroline Murphy](#)

TWS updates climate change and grazing position statements – The Wildlife Society's governing Council recently [released](#) updated position statement on [Climate Change, Sustainability, and Wildlife](#) and [Rangeland Livestock Grazing](#). TWS' [position statements](#) are broad and topical messages on important wildlife issues that are part of TWS' suite of [policy engagement resources](#).
