This year's annual meeting was a great success, bringing in over 150 wildlife professionals and students from Colorado for an opportunity to network and learn from one another.

The meeting included workshops, a symposium on Sensitive Species Conservation and Management in Colorado, a keynote address from Colorado Parks and Wildlife Director Jeff Davis, a student networking breakfast, plenary sessions of sensitive species conservation case studies with a plenary address from Dr. Sara Oyler-McCance on the use of molecular tools for endangered species management, a discussion on wolf ecology and wolf reintroduction in the state, and IGNITE, contributed paper, and poster sessions. Hosted in the Home of Heroes, veterans Jonathan Hicks and Lacey Sprouse shared their stories and honored military veterans in the wildlife profession,



The CSU Pueblo student chapter attended the CCTWS annual meeting in Pueblo, and has held several events for its members, including a resume and cover letter workshop, walleye spawn volunteer day, and a tour of the National Eagle and Wildlife Repository. Upcoming events include a federal application process workshop and participation in the Great American Cleanup.

Our lineup of student chapter officers was Annate'a Saylor, our Student Chapter president, Erik Rathmann as vice president, Amanda Aulenbach as secretary, Lauren Hirsch as historian and Caleb Lindahl as treasurer.


Our first meeting was a workshop where we learned how to use the seeds from loc wild Brassicaceae flowers to make our own mustard. Other popular workshops following that semester include a quinzhee building workshop, a wildlife snow tracking workshop, a citizen science workshop on caribou collar tracking, and an aqua scaping workshop.

The new, and current officers of our student chapter include Erik Rathmann as Student Chapter president, Caleb Park as vice president, Timothy Andrews as secretary and Anders Covey as both the historian and the treasurer. Traditionally, w started our semester with our first meeting with a hike to the water towers right behind our campus and learned some history of the local land. Throughout the semester, we held workshops such as creating and learning how to use an iNaturalist account, how to set up camera traps, and learning a bit about local tree diseases and harmful insects managed by the US Forest Service. Some of our more active meetings included a beaver watching hike and a fall colors hike.

From November 4th to the 11th, our student chapter gathered nine students to Louisville, Kentucky for the annual national Wildlife Society Conference. These conferences are an amazing way for our students to leave the comforts of our small town for a bit and learn from professionals in the field and network with them.

It was an amazing and successful year for our student chapter, and we already have some new ideas brewing for this new spring semester, such as community designed wildlife stickers, track casting, and even helping to host a free hunters education program for students with Colorado Parks and Wildlife.


