 - International members from/in Latin America and the Caribbean
 - US/CA members working or conducting research in Latin America and the Caribbean
 - American-born Latinos/Caribbean who aim to meet other professionals from the region

 - Facilitate the communication and exchange of information among members of the Society interested in, conducting research in, and are from LAC.
 - Diversify the Society membership through identifying and removing barriers to recruitment and member retention of LACs.
 - Increase the visibility of LACs in the Society and the wildlife profession
 - Support and establish chapters of the Society in LAC.



Goals Advocacy and Visibility

- Increase representation of Latin American and Caribbean (LAC)
 professionals, researchers, and students within The Wildlife
 Society's leadership, committees, and decision-making processes
 - Creating more accessibility, for example, helping mitigate financial and language barriers
 - Support initiatives that promote inclusive education and career development pathways for LAC individuals interested in wildlife conservation.
- Collaborate with other working groups and entities to develop and promote position statements, resolutions, and technical reviews that address conservation challenges specific to LAC regions









- How we want to increase communication:
 - Provide regular newsletter updates
 - Schedule open meetings to share updates
 - Use Social Media as a Platform
 - Develop an interactive map for networking
 - Have representatives for regions with heavy
 Latin and Caribbean Demographics:
 - Mexico, Southwest, Florida, etc
 - Minimize language barriers
 - Foster a supportive network where professionals, researchers, and students can collaborate

 - Updates from Mexican Chapter and Southwest Chapter






















Mexican Chapter Updates














Luis Tarango

Dr. Luis Antonio Tarango Arámbula is a wildlife professor and researcher at the Colegio de Postgraduados in San Luis Potosí, Mexico. He has specialized in wildlife management and conservation for 32 years, focusing on vulnerable, threatened, and endangered species that inhabit forest and arid environments. Dr. Tarango holds a Bachelor's degree from Universidad Autónoma de Chapingo, a Master's degree from New Mexico State University, and a Ph.D. from The University of Arizona. He has chaired two National Conferences on Wildlife Management and Conservation and has received multiple national and international recognitions for his contributions to ecological research and wildlife conservation. Dr. Tarango has also played a crucial role in the formation of the Mexican Chapter of The Wildlife Society. He has led the initiative to establish it and is now working to finalize details in making the Mexico Chapter official.










- Creating a marketing and outreach plan for Hispanic Heritage Month


