

Award Nominations

THE JOHN PEARCE MEMORIAL AWARD

The John Pearce Memorial Award is awarded by the Northeast Section of The Wildlife Society to Society members in the Northeast for outstanding professional accomplishments in wildlife conservation in the Northeast.

Criteria

The John Pearce Memorial Award shall be made by the Northeast Section of The Wildlife Society to Society members in the Northeast for outstanding professional accomplishments in wildlife conservation in the Northeast. The basic criteria for judging professional accomplishment of nominees shall be (1) contribution of knowledge and (2) leadership over a period of several years in any areas of wildlife work, including research, management, administration, or education – as evidence by publications, skillful development, and/or application of effective management or educational programs or methods. Any member of The Northeast Section of The Wildlife Society may nominate persons to be considered by the Awards Committee. The award may be made to an individual, or jointly to individuals who have worked together for several years.

THE P.F. ENGLISH MEMORIAL AWARD

The P.F. English Memorial Award is presented annually by the Northeast Section of The Wildlife Society to the outstanding undergraduate senior student of wildlife biology or wildlife management within the region. Its purpose is to acknowledge and to encourage students, and to perpetuate the name of the late P.F. English, an outstanding educator, sportsman, and inspiration to youth.

Background

Dr. P. English was an outstanding educator in the field of wildlife management. He published approximately 50 papers and directed the graduate program of over 60 students. In a classroom or on a field trip, his personal philosophy had an impact that carried far beyond the scope of his courses. He staked his professional reputation and ability as a teacher on the competence of his students. Over the years he stuck by the conviction that his students' accomplishments had not betrayed his trust. He was a charter member of The Wildlife Society and was President from 1946 to 1947.

Criteria

- Student must be a senior.
- Student must be enrolled in a wildlife biology or wildlife management curriculum including forest science programs with a major in wildlife.
- The student must show evidence of promise and/or achievement in scholarship, work experience and professional activities.

The Executive Board meets in person twice per year: once at The Wildlife Society annual meeting, and once at the North East Fish and Wildlife Association meeting. Virtual meetings are held as needed. Membership in both the Northeast Section and TWS are required to hold Section office. Nominations are due

Member At Large

The Member at Large serves a two-year term. Members at Large serve in a non-voting, advisory role on the Executive Committee.

Secretary

The Secretary issues notices of the annual meeting and of all proposed amendments to the Bylaws, records the minutes of the annual meeting and distributes them to the membership, keeps the minutes of meetings of the Executive Committee, maintains the membership rolls, conducts general correspondence and acts as custodian of the Section's records. The Secretary is a voting member of the Executive Committee and serves two-year term.

President Elect

The President elect serves for three years: one year as president elect, one year as president, and one year as past president.

Conservation Highlight

Biodiversity Works, in partnership with The Reservations. ofreceived Trustees MassWildlife Habitat Restoration Grant to improve habitat for black racers at Long Point Wildlife Refuge (a property of the spring In the Trustees). BiodiversityWorks implemented their habitat improvement plans, which were to construct two hibernacula on the refuge and a road underpass to keep racers off the busy summer beach entrance road. In some ways, this was a proof of concept project as no one was certain whether black racers would follow the drift fence and use the underpass.





The team was thrilled to see the first black racers using the underpass in mid-June and some racer activity in the bucket traps. With validation of their design, they hope to install underpasses in other areas of Martha's Vineyard where black racers have suffered road mortality along the south shore of the island

The drift fence also needed to withstand prescribed burns, so galvanized window screening was tested to see if it could function in this capacity. Biodiversity Works has been monitoring for racer use of the underpass and responses to the drift fence with camera traps; including bucket camera traps along the fence.

SUNY Cobleskill Continues Outreach Tradition with 26th Fisheries and Wildlife Festival

Student clubs in the Fisheries, Wildlife, and Environmental Science department at Cobleskill, led by the SUNY Cobleskill Student Chapter of The Wildlife Society (TWS), continued their tradition of public outreach and education by delivering the 26th Fisheries and Wildlife Festival on 29 April 2023. This annual event brings together local vendors, exhibitors, and conservation agencies to Veterans Memorial Centre Park in Cobleskill, NY for a day of environmental outreach and engagement. The 26th Fisheries and Wildlife Festival featured 6 vendors, 14 exhibitors, 10 student clubs, and was supported by 70 student volunteers.



During the event, the ca. 400 community members that attended were able to participate in a youth fishing derby, complete conservation-themed activities and games, learn about local natural resources, and meet natural resources professionals including wildlife biologists, forest rangers, and state park managers among others. The youth fishing derby is a particularly popular activity and is supported by trout that are raised by students and staff on campus in our 40,000-gallon cold water hatchery. Youth participants were also treated to wildlife-themed face painting and balloon twisting.



Planning for the Fisheries and Wildlife Festival starts during January with the formation of the Festival Planning Committee. By President default, the and Treasurer of the Student Chapter of TWS serve initial leadership roles in planning. Other officers of the student chapter also serve on the planning committee along with appointed representatives from other student clubs (e.g., American

Fisheries Society) on campus. In recent years, the planning committee has been composed of 8-12 members representing a collaborative effort among students with diverse interests. By early-April, local vendors and exhibitors have been secured, festival layout has been planned, and local advertising strategies have been developed.

From 2020-2021, the Fisheries and Wildlife Festival was paused due to limitations on inperson events as a result of the Covid-19 pandemic. During this time, students with previous experience planning the festival graduated leaving behind a new crop of green students to take the reins on festival planning. In 2022, our students delivered a successful 25th festival "reboot" and we carried this momentum into our 26th festival. Looking forward, consistent student involvement and strategic incorporation of Freshmen-Senior volunteers will help to ensure the annual Fisheries and Wildlife Festival remains a staple outreach event that community members look forward to each year.
