The Wildlife Society (TWS) recognizes that diverse lived experiences and cultural perspectives strengthen the wildlife profession and support more holistic approaches to conservation. Indigenous communities bring valuable knowledge systems, relationships to the land, and stewardship practices that can advance conservation outcomes and professional practice.

The TWS Native People's Wildlife Management Working Group (NPWMWG) membership, composed of wildlife professionals and students, tribal and non-tribal, recognizes native peoples' cultural, spiritual, and biological connections to the land. TWS and the NPWMWG support the development of Indigenous wildlife professionals.

Eligibility:

- Member of a Native American, First Nations, Métis, Inuit, or Indigenous Tribe with political or legal recognition, or individuals who are actively engaged with Indigenous-led organizations (e.g., Native Hawaiian Organizations or Alaska Native Corporations)
- Currently enrolled in an undergraduate or graduate program in a relevant academic discipline.
- Display a record of academic excellence and a strong interest in pursuing a career in wildlife management or conservation.
- Students within 6 months of graduation are eligible.

Applications must include:

- Name, address, email, phone number, tribal affiliation, name of college or university
- Current level of study (undergraduate or graduate) and field of study
- Most recent transcripts (Unofficial are fine)
- Essay (500-750 words) explaining why you would like to participate and how this program might benefit your career development.
